Program outcomes

Upon completion of this program, graduates will have:

- 1. A clearer understanding of the challenges connected with intercultural relations, social justice and cross-cultural communication, and the various approaches to their resolution;
- 2. Better awareness of the complex issues concerning cultural conflicts, racism, power and equality;
- Developed skills to facilitate intercultural relations and cross-cultural communication in the workplace, in the local community, and in international settings;
- 4. Developed skills to assist in reducing conflict and inequities rooted in racism and ethnocentrism.

Courses

You will complete a total of **eight** courses (12.0 units), plus a **final practicum or project** (3.0 units). Choose **four** core courses from the list of options, and tailor the program to your interests and educational needs, while gaining a solid foundation.

In addition, you will choose four 300- or 400-level elective courses from a variety of departments and faculties that focus on issues concerning cross- or intercultural communication, diversity, equity, fairness, or comparative studies of culture, gender, ethnicity and political, social and economic conditions.

Hands-on learning

Towards the end of your program, you will have a unique opportunity to integrate theory with practice by completing either a hands-on practicum or individual final project. The practicum will provide you with a platform to ignite change and create a tangible difference within your community by working at a local, national, or international intercultural organization. The final project offers a chance to synthesize the knowledge you have developed through the program by focusing on a particular passion or area of interest.

Who is this program for?

The Diploma in ISP welcomes students with diverse backgrounds, including those currently involved in professional and volunteer positions in multicultural and cross-cultural environments. It also caters to participants seeking to enhance their understanding of and capacity to tackle social justice concerns while building new communication skills and cultural competence. The program is a great choice for current UVic students who would like to complete a concurrent diploma with their undergraduate degree.
